ANJEC will continue to support their efforts and keep them informed about issues that matter so much to future generations.

As you read this report, please consider ways that we can improve our services and effectiveness. We want to know your suggestions for activities, programs and other ways that ANJEC can help commissions and local officials.

Many thanks to all our supporters – foundations, corporations, and individuals — for enabling ANJEC to continue its mission of environmental protection for our state.

- *ANJEC Report* was mailed quarterly to 2,900 members, and more than 2,000 readers downloaded each issue from our website.
- Our comprehensive website averaged 11,600 visits each month, a 25 percent increase over 2008.
- ANJEC awarded \$180,000 in Smart Growth Planning grants to 31 New Jersey municipalities with environmental commissions.
- Nearly 1,000 people attended ANJEC's 15 workshops, the Environmental Congress, seven Road Shows and seven webinars.
- Under a grant from the NJ Board of Public Utilities, ANJEC worked with the Summit and Hopewell Township Environmental Commissions to develop energy conservation campaigns that were shared with towns across NJ.
- The Resource Center helped nearly 2,000 people with information on environmental issues and municipal operations.
- The White House invited Sandy Batty to hear EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson and Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius at a briefing on Public Health Benefits of Clean Energy Reform.
- The NJ Department of Transportation designated the Bayshore Heritage Byway as a State scenic byway. The South Jersey Bayshore Coalition, which ANJEC coordinates, is the organizational sponsor for the Byway.
- ANJEC ran its second year of Leading Green, our urban leadership program. We trained a diverse group of 15 people from cities throughout NJ.
- We revised, published and distributed our Resource Paper *Major State Programs Affecting Land Use*, which covers State regulations on wetlands, the wastewater management plan, flood hazard areas and CAFRA.
- To help the 76 Highlands municipalities conform with the Highlands Plan, ANJEC analyzed the required steps and explained how to complete them through alerts and two workshops.
- ANJEC developed outreach materials for protecting the Passaic River watershed, including traveling displays, a brochure, the web site www.passaicbasin.org and a Resource Guide on CD.

For 40 years, ANJEC has supported the efforts of environmental commissions, other governmental officials and individuals interested in protecting the environment on the local level. We offer them assistance through our Resource Center, conferences, courses, publications and website.

40th Anniversary

On May 2, over 100 friends gathered to mark ANJEC's anniversary at the State Museum in Trenton. The party offered an opportunity to celebrate the past and share memories with some of the people who played key roles in ANJEC's history.

ANJEC was founded shortly after passage of the 1968 State law allowing municipalities to establish environmental boards, formerly called conservation commissions. As ANJEC's history parallels that of the environmental movement in New Jersey, we honored some pioneers of natural resource protection in the state. We thanked Martha Lieblich and the late Ron Bond, two former trustees and past Board Presidents, whose leadership and tireless dedication helped keep ANJEC going through some of the leaner years when money and staff were scarce. Also, we acknowledged the late Helen Fenske, who was one of ANJEC's founders, and Candace Ashmun, ANJEC's first executive director, who remains an active member of the ANJEC family. ANJEC President Chris Allyn recognized former Executive Director Sally Dudley, who joined the organization in 1987 and officially retired in March 2009 but continues as the volunteer editor of our expansive web site.

To mark ANJEC's 40th anniversary, we asked environmental commissions to send descriptions of their significant accomplishments over the years. Twenty-seven responded, representing newer and older commissions from Cape May to Bergen County. Their accomplishments demonstrate the breadth and depth of the work of commissions. Activities cover environmental resource inventories, open space plans, recycling, and successful community educational campaigns on water and energy. Others did innovative projects like Cranford's getting towns to work cooperatively along the Rahway River, Hammonton's specimen tree survey, Beachwood's push for clean energy and Cape May Point's landscape ordinance. ANJEC Report

More than 2,900 environmental commissioners, municipal officials and environmentalists read ANJEC's quarterly magazine, and nearly 2,000 more download each issue from our web site. The *ANJEC Report* offers in-depth articles on local and statewide environmental issues and regular columns highlighting the urban environment, smart growth, commission achievements, news, Resource Center tips and practical ideas for commissions. This year we added two new columns "Green Team Times" and "Clean Energy Corner." The special 40th anniversary series included an article in each issue focused on ANJEC's past, with the final issue of 2009 featuring an "Illustrated History of ANJEC."

Resource Center

One of ANJEC's greatest strengths is our Resource Center, which provides one-on-one assistance to people calling or emailing with questions on environmental issues or local government operations. To answer them, we rely on our extensive reference library, the comprehensive database of sample ordinances and municipal plans, and the expertise of the ANJEC staff. We receive many inquiries regarding commission operations and starting new commissions. In the past year, local officials also have asked for help on topics such as encouraging renewable energy and sustainable communities, preserving open space, protecting slopes, streams, trees and wetlands, managing stormwater, curbing waste and supporting environmentally sound land use.

To help commissions educate their towns' residents, ANJEC has developed eight different traveling displays that commissions can borrow to use at local fairs and in public buildings. For each display we developed an accompanying brochure and several handouts for commissions to photocopy. In 2009 ANJEC added three new display topics: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle; EQ Energy Challenge; and Protecting the Passaic River. Display usage increased significantly over the past year with many booked every weekend during the spring and fall.

ANJEC Web Site

Our web site, www.anjec.org, offers a wide range of comprehensive information on approaches to local environmental issues. The site received an average of over 11,600 visits each month. Popular web pages included those on sustainable communities, environmental commissions, open space preservation, water protection and conservation easements. In addition, thousands of users downloaded our on-line publications.

Environmental Congress

Over 200 people attended the 2009 Environmental Congress, "The Economics of Green," on October 17. The keynote speakers, NJ DEP Commissioner Mark Mauriello and BPU President Jeanne Fox, offered a glimpse of what was happening at the State level to secure natural resources, reduce greenhouse gases and ensure a positive energy future for New Jersey. The nine workshops covered the topics of green design, towns saving money by being green, transportation, agriculture, ecologically based planning, green business, court decisions on environmental ordinances, the financial value of open space and greening our ports. ANJEC also used the opportunity to present Achievement Awards to seven environmental commissions and three nonprofits, and gave honorable mentions to three other commissions. Twenty-eight nonprofit and governmental organizations cosponsored the event.



Workshops

In March, ANJEC's annual Commissioners Course covered effective commission operations, environmental resource inventories, master plans and ordinances, and site plan review. We held the course in three locations – Tinton Falls, Pilesgrove and Roseland – with a total of 115 commissioners attending. The presentations were repeated in three webinars in June, reaching an additional 75 people over the internet. In addition, ANJEC presented nine workshops on topics including Highlands protection, flood and stream regulations, protecting the Passaic River, environmental resource inventories, energy audits, and sustainable communities. We also repeated our urban leadership training program with a six-session course in 2009.

ANJEC presented seven Road Shows, for which commissions chose the date, location and topics to be covered. A total of 142 people attended, representing environmental commissions, town councils, planning and zoning boards, open space committees, and the public. Commissions selected presentations on effective commission operations, sustainable communities, site plan review, open space preservation and stewardship, and environmental marketing.

Webinars

Webinars – where participants hear a lecture by telephone and simultaneously view the on-line slide presentation – are an increasingly popular way for commissioners to receive ANJEC's time-tested instruction. Often, participants put us on speaker phone, so their whole commission can join on one connection. We held seven webinars in 2009, with over 200 people participating. Recordings of webinars are on our website so others can access the courses at their leisure.

With foundation support, ANJEC develops and administers special projects that address current issues affecting environmental commissions throughout the state.

Smart Growth Grants

Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation

In 2009, through the Smart Growth Planning Grants Program, ANJEC awarded \$180,000 in matching grants to New Jersey municipalities and counties with environmental commissions. The program, generously funded by the Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation and administered by ANJEC, has contributed a total of \$1.34 million for 186 local planning projects in 165 municipalities and counties since 2002. The 2009 grants ranged from \$3,000 to \$12,000.

These grants help towns, with the participation of their environmental commissions, to develop capacity-based land use plans and ordinances that will protect natural resources and health, and create sustainable, livable communities with sufficient green infrastructure. They also offer an avenue for environmental commissions to become actively engaged in local land use planning, and to gain expertise and experience on local environmental issues.

Half of the 31 funded projects for 2009 were environmental resource inventories. Recipient towns for ERIs were Deptford, Englewood, Fair Lawn, Green Brook, Hillsborough, Lindenwold, Livingston, Milltown, Mountain Lakes, Paulsboro, Pemberton, Robbinsville, Vineland and Westhampton. Additional 2009 projects included Open Space Plans and Trails/Greenway Plans (Byram/Hopatcong/ Stanhope, East Hanover, Kingwood, Maplewood, Metuchen, Vernon), Green Building/Sustainability Plans (Berkeley Heights/Summit, Lawrence, Newark, Rahway), Build-Out Analysis (Fairfield – Cumberland Co), Non-Contiguous Cluster Ordinance (Delaware), Dune Vegetation Management Plan (Avalon), and a Critical Habitat Survey (Woodstown-Pilesgrove).

Sustainable Communities

The Fund for New Jersey

ANJEC supported the sustainability efforts of environmental commissioners and municipal officials through the *ANJEC Report*, website postings, workshops, webinars and traveling displays. A new *ANJEC Report* column, the "Green Team Times," provided helpful information and resources for sustainable land use in municipalities. The Sustainable Communities Guide continues to be one of the most popular sections of our website, attracting over 2,300 visits in 2009. We updated it weekly, incorporating case studies, information, resources and tools to help commissions foster sustainability.

ANJEC also organized several presentations on sustainability. The workshop on Green Building in the new, 'green' Dodge Foundation building had a capacity crowd of 55 attendees. We also hosted two workshops and one webinar to introduce the Sustainable Jersey program to a total of 107 environmental commissioners. As active participants in Sustainable Jersey, we helped author several of the toolkits that detail the tasks towns complete to become certified as "sustainable."

Energy

NJ Board of Public Utilities

From October 2008 through December 2009, ANJEC worked with the Summit and Hopewell Township Environmental Commissions to develop energy conservation campaigns that could be adapted and shared with other towns. The Summit Commission created the *Summit Energy Ambassadors* program, which trained high school students to educate small businesses about how to save energy and money. Summit used various methods to publicize the program, entice local businesses to get involved and recognize them for their participation.

With the Hopewell Township Commission, we developed the *EQ Challenge*, a friendly competition that encourages residents to track their energy conservation efforts and compare with other neighbors'. The Commission created the *EQ Tracker*, a data collection program on the Township web site where residents enter their monthly electricity usage and compare it with the same month the previous year. The *EQ Tracker* also compares the results against those of all residents participating in the program.

ANJEC developed a special EQ Challenge web site, logo, stationery, flyers, posters, email messages, press releases, a special game and portable display. We created and distributed a CD toolkit containing case histories of these two outreach programs, samples and templates of all the educational materials, and a long list of other resources for environmental commissions and green teams.

Reducing Energy Use and Greenhouse Gases ANJEC has continued to help commissions to reduce their towns' generation of greenhouse gas and energy consumption. Seventy people participated in a webinar cosponsored with NJDEP explaining the Greenhouse Gas Reduction grant program. ANJEC also worked with NJ Natural Gas to co-host a workshop on programs and incentives to help towns conserve energy and promote conservation by residents and businesses.

Clean Energy ANJEC published articles in the *ANJEC Report* and continually updated our website with the latest information on towns' activities to promote clean energy. In November, the White House invited Sandy Batty to a briefing on Public Health Benefits of Clean Energy Reform. EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson and Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius spoke, followed by several of their staff members. About 150 environmentalists, health workers and community activists attended from across the country. Sandy shared information from the briefing in the winter *ANJEC Report* to inspire commissions to focus on the health impacts of energy consumption.

South Jersey

William Penn Foundation

ANJEC has continued as lead organization for the South Jersey Bayshore Coalition (www.sjbayshore.org) a group of 25 environmental and historic nonprofits working to protect the cultural heritage and environmental integrity of the Delaware Bay watershed. Throughout 2009, Coalition members worked closely on many conservation, preservation and environmental initiatives within the Delaware Bay watershed region.

As sponsor of the South Jersey Bayshore Heritage Byway, the Coalition obtained resolutions of support for the Byway from all 19 municipalities and three counties along the route. To mark the designation by NJ Department of Transportation (NJDOT), ANJEC coordinated an event for over 75 attendees, including NJDOT Commissioner Stephen Dilts, and several federal, state, county and local officials.

Other Coalition initiatives included promoting passage of the Garden State Preservation Trust ballot question; working with the City of Millville on planning for the Union Lake area; applying for a National Heritage Area feasibility study; meeting with NJ DEP on concerns about proposed sewer service areas; and a comprehensive list of the Bayshore's special areas and designations. Thanks to the Coalition's efforts, 2009 saw preservation of the farmland within the acquisition boundaries of the Supawna National Wildlife Refuge in Pennsville.

ANJEC's southern staff also worked closely with environmental commissions to help them protect wetlands, vernal ponds and critical habitat; develop environmental resource inventories; and participate in development application review. The staff started a Salem-Cumberland County commission networking program to share information.

Urban Project

The Fund for New Jersey

Schumann Fund for New Jersey

In April, ANJEC kicked off its second year of Leading Green, our urban leadership program, whose goal is to strengthen the environmental capacity of urban leaders. Through the six-session course, we trained a diverse group of 15 people representing environmental commissions, a zoning board, several community-based organizations and two college interns. Participants came from cities throughout the state, including Newark, Jersey City, Elizabeth, Bloomfield, Edison, Metuchen, Freehold, Ewing, Asbury Park, Long Branch, Neptune, and Montclair. The program included a weekend retreat at the Princeton Blairstown Center and sessions on sustainability, redevelopment, land use, water and air issues in urban New Jersey. Highlights of the training included tours of the Hackensack River, the Ironbound neighborhood in Newark and the Hoboken waterfront. ANJEC also continued to work with the alumni from the 2008 class, supporting their efforts in their communities and inviting them to the sustainability session.

To support our urban program, each issue of the *ANJEC Report* covered urban topics including Newark's new environmental commission, exploring New Jersey's cities, redevelopment issues, and highlights of urban projects. We also continued to compile and email the monthly electronic newsletter, *Green City Gazette*, which has information on upcoming events, news items, and web links. This year, Urban Project Director Kerry Butch was appointed to the NJ DEP's Environmental Justice Advisory Council to address issues related to cumulative risk.



Highlands

Victoria Foundation

ANJEC staff continued to monitor the NJ Highlands Council as it began implementation of the *Highlands Plan*. The Highlands planning process became linked to the municipal adoption of fair share housing plans when the NJ Council on Affordable Housing (COAH) granted a waiver from its Round Three numbers for municipalities that filed letters of intent to conform with the Highlands Plan. COAH's action provided an extra incentive for municipalities to conform, and 76 of the 88 Highlands towns filed a letter of intent.

ANJEC kept municipal commissioners up to date on developing topics and Council actions. To help municipalities with Conformance, ANJEC analyzed the required steps – called “Modules” – and explained to local officials their significance and how to complete them. ANJEC also held two workshops with the NJ Highlands Coalition about the benefits and steps of Conformance. We also sent periodic email alerts to more than 700 Highlands commissioners and other local officials on pressing issues of concern. ANJEC continues to update our website with the latest Highlands information.

ANJEC also attended and provided written and verbal testimony at meetings of the Council. Project Director Dave Peifer has analyzed and submitted extensive comments on several detailed proposals, including the PSE&G application to upgrade the Susquehanna-Roseland Power Line, and the Tennessee Natural Gas proposal for its pipeline in the northern Highlands. In addition, Dave attended the meetings of the Highlands Development Credit Bank, which will manage the credits in the Transfer of Development Rights (TDR) program.

Water Resources Protection

Environmental Endowment for New Jersey

Through testimony and letters, email alerts to commissioners, and coordination of environmental organizations, ANJEC worked to promote strong State water regulations on stormwater, wetlands and wastewater management. ANJEC also submitted comments to the NJ DEP and the Legislature on water protection issues. ANJEC testified before the State Senate on the Water Quality Management Plan rules and organized meetings for environmental groups to discuss our concerns with NJ DEP on enforcement of the regulations.

We also helped commissions and other local officials protect water resources by ensuring implementation of State regulations in their communities. A webinar in April for municipal engineers and planners focused on use of stormwater best management practices, and an article in the Summer *ANJEC Report* discussed the riparian buffer requirements in the Flood Hazard Area and the Stormwater Management regulations. In addition, Abbie Fair revised and published our Resource Paper *Major State Programs Affecting Land Use*, which covers regulations on wetlands, the wastewater management plan, flood hazard areas and CAFRA. The paper was mailed to all environmental commissions and planning boards and was posted on our website.

Passaic River

US Environmental Protection Agency, Region 2

Under a grant from the US EPA, ANJEC promoted protection and enjoyment of the Passaic River. Our partners in this project were the Passaic River Institute of Montclair State University, Future City, Inc., and the Lower Passaic and Saddle River Alliance. The goal was to give environmental commissioners, other officials and partners the tools and resources to inform the public about protecting the Passaic watershed. As a first step, ANJEC compiled an inventory of key stakeholders, federal and State programs and resources in the Passaic watershed, and outreach materials on Passaic natural resources and how to protect them.

ANJEC then developed outreach materials specifically for the project, including three traveling displays, and a brochure about the Passaic watershed. We worked with the Passaic River Institute (PRI) at Montclair State to create a project web site with interactive maps, which PRI is hosting at www.passaicbasin.org. We assembled a *Resource Guide* on CD containing the brochures, Power Point presentations, a listing and links to Passaic programs, the graphics and text for the displays, and a questionnaire (in English and Spanish) for anglers about fish/crab consumption. We distributed copies of the CD to commissioners and mayors in the watershed. We also held three workshops in Newark, Fairfield and Morris Township to provide background information on the Passaic and ways to protect it, and we published an article in the Summer *ANJEC Report*, “The Passaic River, Essential to a Sustainable Future.”

Environmental Summit

ANJEC coordinates the monthly meetings of the Environmental Summit where over 30 NJ environmental organizations exchange ideas and learn from each other. The Summit enables participants to work on specific areas of expertise and then enlist support from the other environmental organizations. In 2009, meeting topics covered new regulations and legislation on renewable energy, wastewater management planning, local land use controls, affordable housing, regional planning in the Highlands and Pinelands, transportation, and the *State Plan*. The Summit is an example of ANJEC's unique ability to create and maintain coalitions of organizations that come together to resolve conflicts and provide a joint approach to difficult problems.
